CRESCENDO SUMMER INSTITUTE 2021

On 21 July 2021, the 17th Crescendo Summer Institute (CSI) opened its doors in Tokaj, Hungary. The central venue for the event was the Tokaji Ferenc High School, where the opening ceremony was held in the main hall. Special guests of the opening ceremony were Dr Zsófia Koncz, MP, and György Posta, Mayor of Tokaj. Ondřej Šindelář (CZE) bassoonist, a new teacher at the Summer Institute, performed the first movement of Robert Schumann's Fantasiestück (Op. 73), with the participation of pianist Bethany Danel-Brooks (USA). The second half of the evening featured a performance of Antonín Dvořák's Slavonic Dance No. 8 by Samuel Coppin (AUS/SWE), cello teacher, with Dan Marginean (ROU), pianist.

The total number of participants in 2021 was 255, arriving from Austria, the Czech Republic, Finland, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Lithuania, Mexico, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Serbia, Ukraine, Sweden, Switzerland and the United States.

The Crescendo Summer Institute was organised with the aim of raising environmental awareness through the "Play Music and Go Green" movement: Let's play music together, let's protect the Earth together!

In the morning of 22 July 2021, the professional work started under the leadership of 47 teachers. Strings, woodwinds, brass, voice and piano students were invited to participate in solo, chamber music, orchestra and jazz performances. Their repertoire ranged from early to contemporary music, representing many nations and genres.

In addition to musicians, the Institute also involved representatives of different denominations, psychologists, theologians and other arts, which also contributed to its unique identity. In addition to courses of solo instruments, chamber music and voice, there was a wide range of further courses to choose from, such as piano accompanying, opera scenes, baroque ensemble, youth orchestra and improvisation workshop.

Students had solo lessons at least every other day, as well as chamber music lessons and the opportunity to play in an orchestra, based on their teacher's decision. In addition to continuous practice possibilities, their programme included attending high-quality concerts, music history lectures and other performances, participating in small group discussions and spiritual programmes, as well as other organised leisure activities.

The presence of the baroque ensemble has been a tradition at the CSI. The baroque ensemble has been led for many years by Zsolt Kalló. For the first time, the Summer Institute included a three-day Viola da Gamba course given by cellist Réka Nagy. The baroque section offered a special opportunity for instrumental and vocal students interested in early music.

However, instrumental students could practise orchestral playing not only in the baroque ensemble, but also in the aforementioned CSI Symphony Orchestra. This year, the Crescendo Summer Institute Symphony Orchestra learned and performed Mozart's Symphony "Prague" in D major (No. 38. K. 504).

CSI also places particular emphasis on the musical education of the younger generation, and this year our youth course was again open to exceptionally talented young musicians aged between 14 and 16. Students in the Youth section were also able to try their hand at solo and chamber music.

PUBLIC PROGRAMMES

In addition to individual and group lessons, the Crescendo Festival offered a series of concerts and performances for CSI participants. Some of these were also free and open to the public as festival programmes, so residents of Tokaj and tourists could attend the events without paying an entrance fee.

Our public programmes were held in various locations in Tokaj, in order to integrate the local community and promote classical music as widely as possible. Thanks to Tokaj's excellent facilities and wonderful concert venues, the Crescendo Summer Institute's public programmes were again well attended in 2021.



TIME FOR CONTEMPORARY MUSIC – SÁNDOR SZOKOLAY

23 July 2021, 2 pm – Tokaji Ferenc High School

Artistic Director **Tamás Tarjányi** opened the first public concert of the Crescendo Summer Institute 2021, as the first of a series of contemporary music concerts.

In the first performance of the series of concerts promoting the works of Hungarian composers, **János Ferenc Szabó** introduced the audience to the work of Sándor Szokolay. According to Szokolay himself, he wrote by instinct and was guided primarily by his emotions. He focused on the themes of love and the search for God. He was a Lutheran by religion, and several of his songs are included in the Lutheran hymnal. He studied composition under Ferenc Szabó and Ferenc Farkas.

The first song to be performed at the concert was "Golden Cloud", performed by Eszter Finszter and János Ferenc Szabó.

Sándor Szokolay began his musical studies at the Békés-Tarhosi Voice School, which pioneered the Kodály method, where, inspired by his teachers, he began writing etudes, finger exercises and character pieces for children. His Elegy and Pastorella was played on flute by **Boglárka Csapó**.

His works were usually addressed to different people. The first movement of his Solo Sonata No 1 for Violin dedicated to András Simon was performed by **András Vavrinecz**, and the third movement of the three-movement Flute Sonata dedicated to Tihamér Elek was played by **Rebeka Pethő**.

Sándor Szokolay's most famous works are his operas, including the sinister, ominous and suggestive The Blood Wedding, performed in 15 languages. The audience was given a glimpse of the opera through the suite for piano, The Bloodthirsty, whose slow and fast movements use the opera's most suggestive themes. The Nocturne evokes the French surrealist world, the bardic pursuit of the Capriccio the restlessness of forbidden love. The suite was interpreted for the audience by the virtuoso piano playing of **Gergely Bábinszki**.

The composer later commented on his first opera that "in my youth I shouted a lot. [...] But he who does not learn silence after shouting loudly understands nothing." (2004)

After The Bloodthirsty, Szokolay's search for a new sound led him to a new ideal of composition, which was greeted with great acclaim by fellow-musicians. His Etude Op. 65 was performed by **Áron Lescsinszky** (piano).

In the 1990s he was asked to write a piece on a Hungarian theme. Szokolay was inspired by Margaret Island to depict the life of St Margaret in an opera entitled Margaret, the sacrifice dedicated to her homeland, which was also made into an opera film. At the concert, **Laura Topolánszky** sang Ave Maria from the opera Margaret.

In addition to composing operas, writing sacred works also played a very important role in Szokolay's life. His works were inspired by his deep faith and devout love for his beliefs. The concert ended with Sándor Szokolay's Gloria, performed by **Gabriella Fenyvesi**, accompanied by **János Ferenc Szabó**.

JÁNOS LACKFI: SWINGS

23 July 2021, 5 pm – Paulay Ede Theatre

On 23 July 2021, a real curiosity, **János Lackfi**'s Swings, was performed at the Paulay Ede Theatre.

Swings is about the mysticism of existence, it talks about metaphysical issues. It is about whether we can choose between existence and non-existence. Whether the choice is ours. Whether we have the right to decide.

"Four swings, up and down, up and down. Four women's destinies, two of them live nowadays, two of them centuries ago. How do their destinies intertwine? How do mother and daughter torment and love, drag each other to the ground and propel each other to the sky? Are we, humans, bound to each other for life and death? Who gets life and who gets death? Do we sacrifice ourselves or the other one? These are questions that arise in our lives, and now they explode in sharp focus, on stage. Two of our contemporaries who are not saints at all. And two saints from the past who don't play the saint at all. They are very much suffering, passionate people. What are they doing on stage? Maybe we'll find out." – János Lackfi

TIME FOR CONTEMPORARY MUSIC – MÁTÉ BALOGH

24 July 2021, 2 pm – Tokaji Ferenc High School

In the framework of the Time for Contemporary Music concert series we wanted to present young composers. **Máté Balogh**, Junior Prima and Artisjus Prize-winning composer, accepted our invitation. As well as being a musician himself, he spoke about the pieces one by one and the audience was able to listen to an interesting interview with Máté Balogh by pianist and musicologist János Ferenc Szabó.

The leitmotif of the concert programme was the contemporary composer's relationship to his various inspirations. Various exotic folk music inspirations were highlighted in the violin and viola duo *Pseudomakam* and the solo viola composition *Three Songs*. The cycle for cello and piano, 7 *Ants*, is based on the short story (Seven Ants) by Péter Esterházy in his book Fancsikó and Pinta. The piano quartet *Game* (second prize-winning entry for the 2018 1st Buda Beethoven Composition Competition) unfolds a motif from one of Beethoven's best-known songs, the opening movement of the song cycle *An die ferne Geliebte*, in different variations.

Music was performed by Janka Balogh-Jámbor, Anna Kurgyis-Jámbor, András Kurgyis, János Ferenc Szabó and the composer himself. Máté Balogh was thus an example of a composer taking part in the performance of his own work in the Contemporary Music Minutes series. The success of the podium discussion and the interest in the works was

demonstrated by the fact that several participants, teachers and students, asked the composer questions after the concert.

CONTEMPORARY MUSIC MINUTES - ABIGÉL VARGA

26 July 2021, 2 pm – Ferenc Tokaji High School

Máté Balogh and Abigél Varga made their debut at the Summer Institute as young composers. János Ferenc Szabó asked Abigél Varga about composing and about the pieces performed at the concert. The concert was performed by members of the Variart ensemble.

Abigél Varga based the programme of her debut concert on three compositions written in recent years. All three works were written for solo instrument, and the performers were young instrumental musicians who were contemporaries and friends of the composer. Porcelain was performed by Eszter Agárdi on cello; Henrik Szőcs (piano) performed Cochlear Structures, and Gábor Németh (violin) played the piece ...leaves are falling, which is a unique abstraction of Hungarian folk music. The concert was thus an opportunity to draw attention to the joint work of the composer and the performers, and the role of the performer in the creative process. As Abigél Varga spent part of the academic year 2020-2021 in Germany on an Erasmus scholarship, she was also able to talk about the differences between composer education in Germany and in Hungary.

Although only three works by Abigél Varga were performed in the Time for Contemporary Music programme, the play Hinták by János Lackfi, for which she has composed the music, was also presented a few days earlier at the Summer Institute festival. The discussion at the Time for Contemporary Music programme thus also addressed the widely discussed issues of autonomous composition and incidental music composition.

In 2021 the Crescendo Summer Institute continued with a number of programmes that were not open to the general public, but which were also very popular and well attended by participants.

The Summer Institute focuses not only on the musical but also on the spiritual development of the participants when deciding about the various programmes. It is important to us that the participants of the course are supported in their development not only professionally but also personally.

In addition to the programmes open to the general public, the Crescendo Summer Institute also focuses on shaping the participants' worldview and personality. Each year, the Sostenuto programmes offer participants guidance on a particular theme and an opportunity for reflection in small group discussions in the evenings with the participation of teacher, psychologists and theologians leading the groups. This year's theme is the relationship between body, mind and soul and their role in the life of the artist.

The morning Tune In (8:45-9:30) is a day-starting event that covered a variety of topics that are of serious concern to musicians (Unique Unity - speaker Beat Rink; Basics of Life: You Are a Gift - speaker Krisztina Tarjányi; Organizing Life: Time Management - speaker Tracy König)

In addition to the morning tuning sessions, the Summer Institute offered the opportunity to deepen the understanding of the topic through various lectures and workshops (Body-Mind-Soul Workshop, Intimacy and Boundaries, Chat with Theologians).

26 July 2021, 5 pm – Ferenc Tokaji High School

Lecture on Bartók by János Ferenc Szabó, pianist/music historian

Every year, the Crescendo Summer Institute includes at least one music history lecture in its programme. This year, on the occasion of the 140th anniversary of the birth of Béla Bartók, the theme of the music history lecture was Bartók's opera Duke Bluebeard's Castle.

Béla Bartók's only opera, Duke Bluebeard's Castle, is the most performed Hungarian opera. It is a unique work of art: everyone who knows it has a clear opinion of what it is about - but sometimes these opinions differ widely. Every director and conductor has a different take on

the score. How do its famous performers see the work? And what does the libretto tell us about the composers' ideas?

These were the questions explored by János Ferenc Szabó, who concluded the performance with an interview with opera singer Andrea Meláth, who has played the role of "Judith" in the opera on several occasions.
